FICTION | YAA GYASI

Yaa Gyasi was born in Ghana and raised in Huntsville, Alabama. Gyasi recalls being shy as a child, feeling close to her brothers for their shared experiences as young immigrant children in Alabama, and turning to books as her "closest friends." She received a certificate of achievement signed by LeVar Burton after submitting the first story she wrote to the Reading Rainbow Young Writers and Illustrators Contest, which encouraged her, and after reading Toni Morrison's Song of Solomon at the age of 17, she was inspired to choose a career in writing. Her debut novel, *Homegoing*, brought her, at age 26, the National Book Foundation's "5 under 35" honors for 2016. She holds a BA in English from Stanford University and an MFA from the lowa Writers Workshop, where she held a Deanís Graduate Research Fellowship. She currently lives in NYC.



Kim Cross

Kim's first book, What Stands in a Storm, chronicles the biggest tornado outbreak in recorded weather, the April 2011 storm that unleashed 349 tornados on 21 states, killing at least 324 people. What Stands in a Storm was named the inaugural winner of the Fitzgerald Museum Literary Prize for Excellence in Writing and won the first-place ASJA Book Award for General Nonfiction. A Barnes & Noble "Discover" pick, the book was also named one of Amazon's Best Books of 2015 and was a finalist in the GoodReads Choice Awards. A starred review in Publisher's Weekly noted that its detail-oriented reporting anothers a novelist's flair for drama." Kim occasionally teaches advanced reporting at the University of Alabama, where she obtained an undergraduate and master's degree in journalism. She is the co-founder of the Archer City Story Center, a non-profit storytelling center in Texas. She lives with her husband and 9-year-old son in Birmingham, Alabama.



JUVENILE | WATT KEY

Watt Key is an award-winning southern fiction novelist, screenwriter, and speaker. His debut novel, *Alabama Moon*, was released to national acclaim in 2006, and won the prestigious E.B. White Read-Aloud Award, and has been published in eight languages. In 2009 *Alabama Moon* was made into a feature film starring John Goodman.

Watt's subsequent novels have received starred reviews from publications such as Kirkus, Publishers Weekly, and School Library Journal. In addition to his novels and screenplays, Watt writes fiction and nonfiction articles for both local and nationally distributed publications.

Watt Key's juvenile novel, Terror at Bottle Creek, is the 2017 winner of the Alabama Author Award for Juvenile literature.

AUTHOR AWARDS

YOUNG ADULT | ASH PARSONS

Ash Parsons is a 2016 PEN Literary Award Winner and a Literary Arts of Fellow for the Alabama State Council on the Arts. She has been involved in Child and Youth Advocacy since college.

Recently she taught English to middle- and high-school students in rural Alabama. Watching some of her students face seemingly impossible problems helped inspire her first novel, Still Waters.

Additionally she has taught creative writing for Troy University's AC-CESS program and media studies at Auburn University.

Ash lives in Alabama with her family.

Her second book is forthcoming from Penguin Random House in Spring 2018.

Laura Pitts is the director of the Scottsboro Public Library in Scottsboro, Alabama. Laura is a member of the Scottsboro Rotary Club, where she is chairman of the organization's Drop Everything and Read (DEAR) Day program, the American Association of University Women Jackson County Chapter, The Association of Rural and Small Libraries, the American Library Association, and serves on the Alabama Author Awards Committee.

2017 Alabama Library Association Merit Award

Founded in 1974 as the state partner of the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Alabama Humanities Foundation (AHF) fosters learning, understanding, and appreciation of our people, communities, and cultures. 2017 Alabana Library Association Eminent Award

Ms. Fout launched her library career in 1985 quickly rose through the ranks; culminating with becoming Director of the Homewood Public Library in January 2009. Director on January 1, 2009. During her 31 year tenure at Homewood Public library, she has made many significant contributions. A forward thinking leader who embraces advances in library service, Ms. Fout strives for excellence in every aspect of library service. Under her leadership the Homewood Public Library has risen to new heights, exploring program opportunities and unique materials to fit the needs of the community. This commitment to excellence was awarded the first Gold Level Standard A

ward for the State of Alabama by the Alabama Library Association in 2014.

Pat Scales is a retired middle and high school librarian whose program Communicate Through Literature was featured on the Today Show and in various professional journals.

Scales has been actively involved with ALA's Intellectual Freedom Committee for several years, and served two terms as chair. She is a member of the Freedom to Read Foundation, serves on on the Council of Advisers of the National Coalition Against Censorship, and acts as a spokesperson for first amendment issues as they relate to children and young adults. In Fall 2016, Scales received the Defender of Free Speech Award from NCAC. She is the author of Teaching Banned Books: Twelve Guides for Young Readers, Protecting Intellectual Freedom in Your School Library, Books Under Fire: A Hit List of Banned and Challenged Children's Books, Scales on Censorship:

Real Life Lessons from School Library Journal and Defending Frequently Challenged Young Adult Books. She writes a bimonthly column, Scales on Censorship, for School Library Journal, curriculum guides on children's and young adult books for a number of publishers, and is a regular contributor to Book Links magazine.

2017 Alabama Library Association Intellectual Freedom Award

A senior level library administrator with over 20 years of experience in education, as well as considerable international experience, Christopher Shaffer is Dean of Troy University Libraries. He has previously served as Director of Troy's Dothan campus library and was also the social sciences reference librarian on Troy's main campus for one year. Prior to entering the library field, Shaffer spent 8 years as a history teacher in Georgia and one year teaching English as a second language in Slovakia. He received his MLIS from the University of Alabama in 2005 and his Ed.D in Educational Leadership, Policy, and Law from Alabama State University in 2014. He has been published in several peer reviewed journals, has considerable experience writing and implementing grants, and has presented nationally. KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

STEVE BERRY, Opening Session

Steve Berry is the New York Times and #1 internationally bestselling author of 12 Cotton Malone adventures and four stand-alone thrillers. His books have been translated into 40 languages with more than 21,000,000 copies in 51 countries. They consistently appear in the top echelon of the New York Times, USA Today, and Indie bestseller lists.

History lies at the heart of every Steve Berry novel. It's his passion, one he shares with his wife, Elizabeth, which led them to create *History Matters*, a foundation dedicated to historic preservation. In 2012 and 2013 Steve's devotion to historic preservation was recognized by the American Library Association, which named Steve its spokesperson for National Preservation Week. Among his other honors are the Royden B. Davis Distinguished Author Award; the Barnes & Noble Writers for Writer's Award given by Poets & Writers; the Anne Frank Human Writers Award' and the Silver Bullet, bestowed by International Thriller Writers for his philanthropic work.





JIM NEAL, President's Program

Neal is President-Elect of the American Library Association. He has served on the Council and Executive Board, and was ALA Treasurer during 2010-13. He is a member of the OCLC Board of Trustees. He has served on the Board and as President of the Association of Research Libraries, on the Board and as Chair of the Research Libraries Group (RLG), on the Board and as Chair of the National Information Standards Organization(NISO), and on the Board of the Digital Preservation Network. He is on the Board and serves as Treasurer of the Freedom to Read Foundation, and on the Board and serves as Treasurer of the Metropolitan New York Library Council (METRO). He has also participated on numerous international, national, and state professional committees, and is an active member of the International Federation of Library Associations (IFLA). He is a member of the Library Advisory Board of the University of the People.

Tayari Jones, Closing Session

Tayari Jones is the author of the novels Leaving Atlanta, The Untelling, Silver Sparrow, and An American Marriage (Algonquin Books, February 2018). Her writing has appeared in Tin House, The Believer, The New York Times, and Callaloo. A member of the Fellowship of Southern Writers, she has also been a recipient of the Hurston/Wright Legacy Award, Lifetime Achievement Award in Fine Arts from the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation, United States Artist Fellowship, NEA Fellowship and Radcliffe Institute Bunting Fellowship. Silver Sparrow was named a #1 Indie Next Pick by booksellers in 2011, and the NEA added it to its Big Read Library of classics in 2016. Jones is a graduate of Spelman College, University of Iowa, and Arizona State University. She is currently an Associate Professor in the MFA program at Rutgers-Newark University.

Managing Access to Streaming Media in RDA

The presentation will explore the key issues associated with the process of creating full level bibliographic records for streaming media based on the Resource Description and Access (RDA) standard and MARC 21 metadata schema. It will share useful cataloging documentation and best practices for the construction of MARC 21 metadata with emphasis on the fixed field coding, sources of the title proper, content, media, and carrier information, system requirements, etc. Also, the participants will be introduced to selected examples of the individual records of the Ethnographic Films streaming collection which consists of 200 unique documentaries created by students enrolled in the University of Alabama at Birmingham filmmaking courses from 1999 until present. To increase the discoverability and accessibility of the valuable collection (http://www.mhsl.uab.edu/dc) for online users, the author has created original bibliographic records of the streaming videos and added them to the local OPAC as well as to the OCLC WorldCat database.

Where did all of our books go? Conducting an Inventory Project at Auburn University

Missing and uncatalogued library materials are a constant source of irritation for librarians and their patrons. Here at Auburn University Libraries we have implemented an inventory project to rectify these concerns and to ensure that our records are up-to-date, complete and accurate.

Our collection consists of approximately 3.5 million books and for many years no official inventory had ever been administered. Beginning on the 1st floor in January 2012, we instigated the inventory project using one IPad containing Shelf-Lister software. We soon discovered that we had a large number of books that were missing or that needed item, holding and bibliographic records, as well as corrections to existing call number labels and other record adjustments. It became apparent that the inventory project would be a long and pains-taking process. In 2013 we were provided with a 2nd IPad. After hiring more student workers we were able to more quickly divide and process the north and south ranges of the 3rd floor and beyond. We propose to describe how we have conducted this inventory project and present our findings in a poster session. Our inventory is still an ongoing project that this past year has been put on hold [as of July 2015] in order to carry out a Provost level mandate for creating space for a building construction project involving the main library building on Mell Street. In addition, an offsite location has been built and much of the print collection is being transferred to this new space. Inventory methods learned since 2012 have been used to go through the closed stacks collection before it is moved offsite.

Trigger Warnings: To Label or Not to Label?

What are trigger warnings and why are they an ethical dilemma for academic libraries? Those for trigger warnings argue they are a "responsible pedagogical practice that treats students with respect and minimizes harm," while those against trigger warnings argue academic freedom is jeopardized by trying to cater to all potential emotional triggers.

This presentation categorizes trigger warnings as an emerging ethical dilemma in academic libraries; indeed, in 2015, American University's library received student requests to flag books on the shelf for triggering content. To label or not to label is the ethical dilemma facing academic libraries. What is the greater good: protecting students from triggering traumatic material or strongly defending freedom from censorship? In academic libraries, stake holders in this debate include current and future students; university administration and faculty; library administration, faculty, and staff; professional organizations; and vendors. According to the ACRL, academic libraries should not label materials with trigger warnings. However, this presentation proposes an ethical resolution whereby trigger warnings can be used in the academic library, based upon reality, student autonomy, and existing classification schemes. Finally, this presentation argues that trigger warnings in the academic library should be viewed through the lens of content, context, and mutual obligation to arrive at the most beneficial outcome for all concerned.

Starting from Scratch: Houston Cole Library's Inaugural Tailgate Open House

The Houston Cole Library welcomed Jacksonville State University students, faculty, staff and the greater comm**u**nity to the new academic year by hosting its inaugural Tailgate Open House Thursday, September 15, 2016. Students were informed of the upcoming celebration by bookmarks, posters, and social media. A collaborative planning committee consisted of librarians and

Paraprofessionals. Events took place both inside and outside the Library. Marching band members played in front of the Library while dance line members performed. Lunch and door prizes were provided thanks to the generosity of the Friends of the Library and other donors.

The event attracted over 200 people. Led by Library staff and JSU Ambassadors, 110 students completed a library tour in small groups. The Reference Desk, Instruction Lab, The Alabama Gallery, student computer lab and the Education floor's planned children's reading room were highlighted. Survey results included appreciation for tailgate activities and revealed many first-time Library visitors. Ae counts showed a substantial increase in traffic compared to the number of people entering the Library the previous Thursday. Both were seen as an indicator of success. An evaluation meeting held on September 30, 2016 discussed the positives and negatives of Tailgate Open House 2016 and started the planning for 2017.

How to MAKE a Makerspace Meet Your Goals

Makerspaces have entered libraries to promote the goals of innovation, collaboration, learning, design, and exploration. Public, academic, and school libraries sometimes encounter their libraries' physical spaces to be barriers in meeting these goals. In order for makerspaces to be as successful as possible and ideally promote these values, libraries must thoughtfully engage with their goals and how to best meet those goals in the physical space. Building on Barniskis (2016), this look at makerspaces encourages libraries to think of ways to "recalibrate their message from 'keep out' to 'come in." Poster visitors will see the latest in makerspace design research while having the opportunity to think through design aspects of their own makerspaces in a short activity that is both interactive and thought-provoking.

Tracy B Hinton, Tuscaloosa County Schools

An Exploratory Study of a Robotics Educational Platform on STEM Career Interests in Middle School Students

As we explore ways to support 21st century STEM learning, middle school teachers must seek creative, innovative methods to integrate technology into the curriculum. Based on the popularity of Lego toys, Lego Education has developed various robotics kits, which are effective tools to learn about computer programming and basic engineering concepts. In the middle school classroom, students are more excited and engaged as they design and program interactive robots.

In this poster session, educators will learn about the positive effects of a robotics platform on the attitudes and interests of middle school students toward STEM-based majors and careers. A structured, hands-on robotics educational platform can be a worthwhile activity that encourages collaboration and enhances problem-solving skills. Based on a recent classroom study, the researcher discovered that these activities inspired a love for science, technology, engineering, and/or math that will hopefully develop an increased interest in STEM-based college degree programs and careers.

Library Workshops for Faculty Preparing for Promotion and Tenure Reviews

Faculty who are gathering materials in preparation for a third year, tenure or promotion review may often contact their subject librarians or ILL to get publications or specific data about selected journals, including impact factors, acceptance rates, etc. In light of this, two librarians at Auburn University designed and presented a brief workshop in 2016 on several occasions to address these common questions. Topics presented in the workshop included a review of document delivery services along with resources for information on journal rankings and impact factors, article citation data, journal acceptance rates, Cabell's directory, Ulrichsweb, and the university's institutional repository. Seven workshops were schedule for the fall semester 2016 on days and at times that are typically best for teaching faculty. To gather data, an anonymous voluntary online survey was designed for the participants to complete after attending a workshop. The survey data provides information about the participants intended reasons for attending,

their subsequent level of confidence in using the resources and services presented, and which service or resource was the most important topic to them. These data were used by the presenters for consideration concerning changes to workshop planning and content along with how information about library resources and services for faculty may be presented to new faculty by other means or during other campus events. This poster will present information about the development of the workshop through current consideration for future workshops in light of observations and the survey data collected.

The Alabama Digital Preservation Network (ADPNet: http://adpn.org/) marked its 10th anniversary last year. Started in 2006-2007, the LOCKSS-based, community-owned digital preservation (DP) network successfully met a number of challenges in its first decade and has emerged as an affordable solution for academic and public libraries alike. Representatives from two ADPNet member institutions—an academic and a public library—will give an update on the network's new membership model, which is designed to make ADPNet even more affordable for small to midrange institutions. Among other things, the new membership model includes lower storage fees and a \$6,000 hardware subsidy program for new members. We expect that the session will be of interest to libraries and other cultural heritage institutions that are looking for cost-effective ways to preserve their digital collections while benefiting from the shared expertise that is available in a community-based network.
